Almaty Management University is an entrepreneurial, socially responsible university striving to become more comprehensive and research-oriented. This year we celebrate 35 years in the education market, being the oldest private university in the country, the first business school of Kazakhstan, pioneer of business education in CIS.

The university cooperates with more than 130 universities and associations. AlmaU is committed to the principles of the Third Mission, the UN SDGs, and promotes the Principles of Responsible Management Education (UN PRME).

At AlmaU there are 10 Schools, 3 Centers, the Institute for Education Development and AlmaU Extension (executive education center). 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


AlmaU rallies to aid flood victims

The flooding in Kazakhstan, which began on 27 March 2024, has become the most severe in 80 years. In response, the government declared a state of emergency on 6 April across ten of the country's seventeen regions. By 19 April, about 118,200 people had been evacuated or displaced, including nearly 44,300 children, and around 6,000 homes had been submerged.

In the face of this devastating situation, Almaty Management University (AlmaU) stepped up to provide critical humanitarian aid. The university established a dedicated collection point to mobilize the campus community and local residents to contribute essential supplies.

AlmaU's swift response and commitment to social responsibility were instrumental in providing much-needed relief to those affected by the floods. The university's staff and students worked tirelessly to collect and distribute aid, demonstrating a strong sense of empathy and solidarity.

By the end of the initiative, AlmaU had successfully collected and dispatched 20 tons of humanitarian aid (including food, clothing, and other necessary emergency items) to the flood-affected regions. Furthermore, donations of over one million KZT from the AlmaU community were channeled towards relief efforts. Additionally, in response this catastrophic disaster, AlmaU offered 7 scholarships to cover university tuition fees for children from families affected by the flood

This commendable humanitarian effort underscores AlmaU's not only unwavering commitment to social responsibility but also highlights its ability to make a tangible, positive impact society, demonstrating on compassion and a steadfast dedication to community service even in times of crisis.

It aimed to improve participants' financial well-being through practical tips for better money management and discussed important aspects of consumer protection within the financial services industry.

Additionally, the event introduced emerging trends in the financial world, including innovations like the digital tenge and Islamic finance. Overall, **AlmaU Fin-2023** provided participants with the knowledge and practical tools to make informed financial decisions and work toward achieving their long-term financial goals.











AlmaU students learning sustainable agriculture innovation

This year, three undergraduate students of AlmaU's School of Management, designed their thesis projects around the topics of sustainable agriculture, food commodity markets, food security, and agricultural export.

Kamila Almazbekova, Dayana Yerlankyzy, and Arailym Rakhym researched supply chain management in the production and distribution of agricultural products, examining how inefficiencies in logistics and distribution affect the timeliness and cost-effectiveness of agricultural supply chains.



Ayaulym Seidaliyeva, Gulsana Abdina, and Fariza Karsan tackled the topic of improving transportation technology for perishable goods, proposing innovative solutions to enhance the transportation infrastructure and reduce losses for highly perishable agricultural products. Gulzada Opabek, Yenlik Suranshy, and Assem Ginayatova concentrated on the grain transportation process, exploring strategies to optimize grain movement from farms to markets, emphasizing improving efficiency and reducing transportation costs.










A growing concern: fast food and unhealthy habits among Almaty students

As part of their university course on service learning, students of Almaty Management University conducted a research project jointly with the national association "Densaulyq". 87 first-year students of AlmaU were involved in the study as volunteer interviewers. The study that employed sociological surveys and gathered data from 1013 respondents from 17 universities between the ages of 18 to 20, revealed alarming trends in the dietary and lifestyle habits of Almaty's student population.

The project also compared data from 2017 to 2024, highlighting a significant increase in fast food consumption and other unhealthy behaviors among the young population.

Key findings from the study indicate a rise unhealthy lifestyle habits among students. Fast food consumption has increased significantly, with 85% of students reporting regular consumption in 2024, up from 74% in 2017. This trend is largely driven by the perception of fast food as both tasty and trendy. Similarly, the consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages is also high, with over 83% of students drinking sugary drinks, and 54% doing so daily, compared to 70% and 51%, respectively, in 2017. Although there has been a slight decline in overall alcohol consumption, 26% of students consume alcohol on a weekly basis or more. The use of nicotine has risen, particularly through electronic cigarettes, with 60% of students reporting usage.











A growing concern: fast food and unhealthy habits among Almaty students

To address these unhealthy trends, AlmaU and other institutions will implement several strategies. These include integrating health education into the curriculum, promoting healthier food options campus, and launching awareness campaigns about the risks of unhealthy lifestyles. They will also provide accessible counseling services and partner with local health organizations to support student well-being. By taking these steps, AlmaU and similar institutions will help promote healthier lifestyles and contribute to a healthier society.











Joint research project of AlmaU and LehighU students aiming to reduce high salt intake in KZ



An educational partnership between Lehigh University (USA) and Almaty Management University (AlmaU) has assembled a dedicated team of undergraduate students to address the pressing health issue of excessive salt consumption in Kazakhstan. The team, comprising Khanjan Mehta, Ainar Nurgaliyev, Joseph Menicucci, Ella Sokich, Asher Mendelson, Daniel Weir, Marcos Torrez, Umid Abdullayev, Aidana Baibulsinova, and Amina Tolgen, conducted rigorous research titled "Towards Low-Sodium Diets: Educational and Policy Approaches" to develop innovative solutions. This collaborative research initiative between Lehigh University and AlmaU holds the potential to significantly impact public health in Kazakhstan by promoting healthier dietary habits and reducing the burden of salt-related diseases.

The project aims to address a significant health concern around widespread consumption of high-sodium foods. More specifically, the project targets the broader aim of creating a certification system that would identify and promote low-sodium products in Kazakhstan markets, empowering consumers to make informed choices affecting their health and wellbeing.

The study was presented and published at the IEEE conference at Villanova University (UAS). The publication will be available on Google Scholar and indexed in the Scopus database.

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A Tribute to a **Champion: The First Samat Musin Ski Crossing**

On December 17, 2023, the village of Lobanovo in North Kazakhstan witnessed a historically significant event: the inaugural Samat Mussin Ski Crossing championship. This event was a tribute to the legendary Kazakh skier, Samat Musin, master of sports of international class, multiple-time Kazakhstan champion, and two-time silver and bronze medalist in the USSR cross-country skiing championships. The main aim of the event was to revitalize winter sports in the region.

Initiated by AlmaU president Dr. Assylbek Kozhakhmetov and jointly organized by AlmaU and Zeynep Higher Multidisciplinary College the event drew a large crowd, including local residents, students, and government officials. The 7-kilometer ski route traversed the same terrain that once challenged Samat Mussin, inspiring participants to push their limits.

Beyond the ski crossing, the event offered a variety of winter activities, such as archery, sledding, and skating. Masterclasses on entrepreneurship, hospitality, and traditional crafts were also conducted, showcasing the diverse cultural heritage of the region. A farmers' market added a vibrant touch, offering locally sourced products.

AlmaU hosts international seminar on modern psychology

On November 10, 2023, as part of AlmaU's 35th anniversary celebration. international scientific and an educational seminar was held on modern aspects of psychology in Kazakhstan. seminar The covered topics such as cognitive behavioral therapy, gestalt therapy. psychoanalysis, transactional analysis, and an integrative approach. It brought together scientists and practitioners who contributed have to the development of psychology in the country.



Participants from across Kazakhstan, as well as online attendees from distant locations, highlighted the global reach of the event. The conference was conducted in three languages, making it accessible to a broad audience.



The seminar explored various psychological approaches, including cognitive-behavioral therapy, gestalt therapy, psychoanalysis, and transactional analysis. Participants learned from experts and discussed key topics such as mental health strategies for young people, the practical applications of CBT, using Gestalt principles for personal growth and relationships, the impact of the unconscious mind, and communication patterns in relationships. The event highlighted the importance of psychological well-being and the role of psychology in addressing societal challenges, with AlmaU aiming to advance the field and promote overall well-being in Kazakhstan.







Improving digital healthcare services in Kazakhstan:

assessment methodology and enhancement strategies in the post-COVID era

The project "The Quality of Digital Services of Medical Institutions in Kazakhstan in the Context of a Pandemic: Assessment Methodology and **Improvement** Mechanisms" is being implemented from 2022 to 2024, led by Dr. Orazgaliyeva, a researcher from AlmaU School of Management. Funded by the Committee of Science of Kazakhstan's Ministry of Science and Higher Education through the Zhas Galym grant (18 million KZT), the project focuses on improving digital services in Kazakhstan's healthcare sector, especially in response COVID-19 pandemic.

The goal is to assess and enhance the effectiveness of digital healthcare services by identifying gaps and proposing solutions for improvement, particularly through organizational, economic, and marketing mechanisms. The project aims to develop a methodology for evaluating digital healthcare quality, addressing the lack of clear indicators and frameworks for assessing the impact of digitalization on healthcare services.



A key issue is the disconnect between rapid digital adoption and the actual improvement service quality. Despite significant investments in digital infrastructure, patient satisfaction with digital services remains low. The project seeks to address this by gathering identifying patient feedback. shortcomings. and proposing solutions. including the creation of an information platform to improve communication between patients and healthcare providers. The project aims to create a sustainable, patient-centered digital healthcare ecosystem in Kazakhstan.

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AlmaU hosts anniversary forum of the Academic **Integrity League**

On April 19, the Academic Integrity League hosted its Anniversary Forum at Almaty Management University, one of the co-founder of the League, celebrating its 5th anniversary. The Forum brought together over 200 participants from Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, Kyrgyzstan, Lithuania, and the Philippines, including representatives from 26 universities and organizations. Of the attendees, 125 participated in person, while more than 80 joined online. The event provided a significant boost to promoting a culture of academic integrity within Kazakhstan's higher education system. During the Forum, several experts and leaders who have made notable contributions to the field of academic integrity were honored.



Concurrently, the League held its General Meeting, coming up with the following decisions:

- A working group was formed to develop a new standard for the League based on the AIRS 2.0 ICAI framework.
- The League's Project Office will begin preparing a unified digital platform to streamline monitoring processes and implement online monitoring tools.
- The General Meeting decided to transfer the Chairmanship of the League to Aktobe Regional University named after Zhubanov for one year.







AlmaU launches its first educational programs at its Sharmanov School of Health Sciences to honor the legacy of the prominent academician

In the fall of 2023, first educational programs were launched in AlmaU's brand new Sharmanov School of Health Sciences (SSHS) named in honor of the academician Toregeldi Sharmanov, a prominent Kazakh medical scientist, founder and president of the Kazakh Academy of Nutrition.



Toregeldi Sharmanov's invaluable **legacies** nutrition. include pioneering research in significant contributions to public health policy in Kazakhstan, and a lasting impact on medical education and the prevention of chronic diseases through improved dietary practices. Following launched these legacies. **AlmaU SSHS** in educational programs psychology and kinesiology, and is currently designing new programs in public health management and nutritionology.

Besides delivering cutting-edge educational programs in health sciences, AlmaU SSHS plans to create a community of practice of experts, researchers, and leaders to make an impact on Kazakhstan's health system. In 2023, the School joined the International Union for Health Promotion and Education (IUHPE), which is a global organization uniting individuals and institutions dedicated to improving public health through education, community action, and policy development.



SDT creates antifraud and automated analytics system for ML-driven online assessments

A research project "Development of an Anti-Fraud and Automatic Analytics System for a Machine Learning-Based Testing Platform" is being implemented from 2022 to 2024 by Dr. Kuanysh Abeshev, Dean of the AlmaU School of Digital Technologies (SDT).

Funded by the Zhas Galym grant of the Ministry of Science and Higher Education, the project aims to develop anti-fraud mechanisms for online testing environments, addressing the need for integrity in digital assessments.

The project will create a system that uses student response data (e.g., time spent on questions) to detect suspicious behavior and generate analytics for educators. Using machine learning algorithms, the system will identify fraudulent actions, such as cheating or external assistance, by analyzing deviations in student behavior. The goal is to provide educators with insights into test sessions, improving the efficiency of online assessments.

The project proceeds in the following stages: data collection and preprocessing, testing machine learning models for fraud detection, validating model accuracy, and integrating the best models into the testing platform. Once validated, the system will be scaled for broader use in online testing platforms. The outcomes will be published in scientific papers, contributing to the field of educational technology and improving fairness in digital education assessments.







Conceptualizing academic excellence in Kazakhstan:

a national research project to strengthen higher education across the country

AlmaU is proud to announce that in 2023, the national research project "Development of Scientific, Methodological, and Conceptual Foundations for Implementing the Academic Excellence Initiative in Higher Education and Science in Kazakhstan" led by Dr. Renata Kudaibergenova, Director of the Quality Assurance Office, has started and will run through 2025.

The project is funded by the Ministry of Higher Education and Science. The aim of the project is to establish Academic Excellence Centers at 20 universities across the country as part of Kazakhstan's broader strategy to enhance the global competitiveness of its higher education system, with a special attention to regional and suburban universities, as outlined by President Tokayev.

These centers will feature technology parks, engineering hubs, and laboratories designed to meet Kazakhstan's diverse region's scientific, technological, and economic needs. The project with reviewina began practices in academic excellence from across the world, focusing specific needs Kazakhstan's universities. The project will also create a practical model for implementing academic excellence, supported by detailed guidelines and regulatory documents. This model will be piloted at a select group of universities before being expanded nationwide. In addition, training programs will be organized to equip university staff with the skills needed to implement and sustain the initiative, helping to strengthen Kazakhstan's higher education sector and contribute to the country's socio-economic development.




AlmaU Vice-Rector Assel Aryn runs in the largest international women's marathon in Japan


This site visit provided students with a practical understanding of renewable energy technologies and their potential to address climate change and energy security challenges.

The day began with a visit to a stateof-the-art solar power plant. The tour then moved to a wind power plant, where students learned about wind turbine technology.








AlmaU joined the expert team to create the new "Atlas of New Professions and Competencies"


In September 2023, Almaty University Management initiated the start of the state "Mamandygym - Bolashagym" ("My profession is my future") project as part of Kazakhstan's national program to increase household incomes by 2029. The initiative aimed to create the new "Atlas of New Professions and Competencies" tailored to Almaty's economy, identifying emerging careers and skills needed in the next 5-10 years. The project focused on key sectors like construction, architecture, urban planning, hospitality, and logistics.

Using a detailed foresight methodology, AlmaU consulted with industry experts, businesses, and academic institutions. The project's goal was to inform local authorities, guide educational institutions in updating curricula, and help businesses prepare for future workforce demands.

The project has already made significant progress, identifying 463 professions, including 239 new roles, 95 evolving careers, and 129 declining jobs. This will inform educational policies and provide valuable career guidance for students.

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
ZhanaOzen Business Bootcamp to support local entrepreneurial communities




AlmaU partners with beam.kz to digitize students' internship experiences

The program addresses key challenges scientists face in commercialization, offering training in business skills. expert mentorship, networking, and access to funding. The program garnered strong interest, with over 180 applications and 30 promising projects selected to participate in this acceleration program.

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8 AlmaU students completes OAP in **InnoBoost Winter 2024**

8 students from the School of Economics and Finance, School of Management, and School of Digital Technologies completed the Opportunity Assessment Plan (OAP) program conducted as part of the "InnoBoost Winter - 2024" acceleration program for innovative startups.

The program ran from January 30 to April 30, 2024, and included key stages such as selecting promising projects, conducting research, and delivering final presentations. Evaluated startups included a skin protection cream, an air purifier, a hemo-absorbent, a fertilizer to boost crop yields, and a woundhealing dressing.



The program aimed to assess startups using the Opportunity Assessment Plan (OAP) methodology, developed by investment expert Professor Gary Gibbons. The OAP assessment was conducted in collaboration with MBA students from the Thunderbird School of Global Management (ASU). Students gained valuable experience that will support their future projects, helping them create and launch their own startups.

Upon successful completion of the program, students were presented with certificates by AlmaU Rector Dr. Gulnara Kurenkeyeva. The Technology Commercialization Center plans to continue using the OAP methodology in future acceleration programs.

The project was funded by the UNDP City Experiment Fund.








Urban October: a month dedicated to sustainable urban development




Understanding the challenges and controversies of ESG in contemporary investment

On September 29, 2023, the AlmaU School of Politics and Law hosted Paolo Sorbello, a journalist and researcher, for a guest lecture on "ESG, the Environment and Its Discontent," as part of the "Sustainable Economy" course. Sorbello, a PhD graduate from the University of Glasgow with expertise in Kazakhstan's oil sector, provided a critical look at Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) factors in investment practices.

Sorbello highlighted that ESG metrics now cover nearly 80% of global market capitalization, spanning 76 countries and over 630 indicators. These factors are essential for assessing risks and opportunities related to climate change, corporate governance, and diversity. However, the lecture's title hinted at a critique of the current ESG landscape.

Sorbello discussed the challenges of data standardization, reliability, and the risk of "greenwashing," where companies misrepresent their sustainability efforts. While ESG has become integral to investment strategies, Sorbello raised concerns about the inconsistencies in data and the potential for misleading claims. His lecture underscored the need for reform to ensure ESG metrics are more transparent and effective in guiding sustainable investment decisions.







AlmaU takes second place in Samsung recycling school competition



The "Coalition for the "green" economy and development of G-Global" is one of the leading "green" non-governmental organizations of Kazakhstan and a public provider of the Concept of Kazakhstan's transition to a "green economy," as well as the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals.

With the support of Coca-Cola Icecek Kazakhstan, the Coalition launched the 9th season of the social project "3.2.1 Start" in April 2024. This project aimed to form a sustainable model for collecting and recycling plastic on university campuses in Kazakhstan, involving young people and promoting green principles and SDGs.

The project's primary objectives were to enhance environmental awareness among Kazakhstani students through education and participation in environmental events, as well as to develop legal skills in the field of ecology.



During the project's initial phase, Almaty Management University established and promoted sustainable plastic collection models on the campus. The project involved conducting information sessions on plastic collection and organizing clean-up days with the participation of AlmaU students.

A significant component of the project was a competition among participating universities. The most active universities received financial support to purchase equipment for plastic processing and further utilization.






AlmaU and LehighU Project "Save Tuba"

Students from both universities have joined forces to tackle pressing global issues, such as climate change, through projects like "SaveTuba."

This initiative aims to educate Kazakh school children of Grade 2-5 about the dangers of climate change and the importance sustainable practices like recycling and waste conservation. Additionally, faculty members universities both have engaged knowledge sharing and collaborative research, fostering innovation and advancing academic excellence. This partnership underscores the international collaboration addressing global challenges and creating a sustainable future.











Restoring the Aral Sea: AlmaU planting saxaul trees for the ecological recovery

The Aral Sea, once one of the world's largest inland lakes, has suffered catastrophic environmental damage due to water diversion for irrigation, leading to soil erosion, salt accumulation, and frequent dust storms. In response, Kazakhstan has initiated several restoration efforts, including a project led by Almaty Management University (AlmaU) to plant saxaul trees on the dried seabed.

Saxaul (Haloxylon species) is a hardy desert plant that thrives in harsh conditions. Its deep roots stabilize the soil, reduce erosion, and mitigate dust storms. The tree also absorbs salts and stores water, improving soil quality and supporting the local ecosystem. Given its ability to self-propagate, saxaul offers a sustainable long-term solution to the region's environmental challenges.









Restoring the Aral Sea: AlmaU planting saxaul trees for the ecological recovery

The Syr Qorgany-Sekseyil project is a crucial step in stabilizing the soil, reducing dust storms, and improving biodiversity in the region. Over time, the natural spread of saxaul will help sustain the area's recovery with minimal ongoing effort.

This initiative underscores AlmaU's commitment to environmental sustainability and demonstrates how universities can play a leading role in ecological restoration. The project serves as a powerful example of how collective action can help address environmental degradation and inspire broader efforts for ecological renewal.

In March 2024, AlmaU launched the Syr Qorgany-Sekseyil eco-volunteer project, mobilizing over 80 volunteers from Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, and beyond. Together, they planted more than 5,000 saxaul seedlings on the seabed. The project, supported by Kazakhstan's Ministry of Ecology, aimed to restore the region's ecological balance while engaging local communities. Volunteers also participated in cultural activities, including visits to the Korkytata memorial complex and talks with environmental experts.



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AlmaU organizes the eco team building at Issyk Lake

Almaty Management University organized a successful eco team building at Issyk Lake, located in the Tien Shan mountains near Almaty, Kazakhstan. Known for its striking turquoise waters and historical significance, Issyk Lake is facing environmental challenges, including climate change, deforestation, and the impact of tourism.



Prior to the cleanup, AlmaU held a recyclable waste training session to educate the university community on proper waste disposal and recycling practices. This training aimed to raise awareness about the environmental impact of waste and equip participants with the knowledge to reduce their ecological footprint.



A research project titled "Independent anticorruption expertise of normative legal acts for law enforcement and national security" runs from 2022 to 2024, led by Almaty Management University postdoctoral scholar Dr. Aizhan Aryn.

Supported by the Zhas Galym grant from Kazakhstan's Ministry of Science and Higher Education, the study focuses on the recent restoration of anti-corruption expertise for normative legal acts by President K. Tokayev. Its goal is to strengthen anti-corruption efforts within Kazakhstan's legal system and enhance national security.

The research aims to improve the expertise of those conducting anticorruption assessments of legal acts. Using comparative legal research, it will analyze the types, legal requirements, and organizational frameworks of anticorruption expertise in Kazakhstan and other member states of the Eurasian Economic Union, including Russia. It will also explore how anti-corruption expertise supports law enforcement and national security.

Key aspects include defining the necessary qualifications for expert training and developing methods for anti-corruption analysis. The research will assess current and future legal measures against corruption, with recommendations for improving anti-corruption examinations. The project's expected outcomes include development of the concept of anti-corruption expertise and proposals for enhancing Kazakhstan's legal and security frameworks.



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
AlmaU held the 31st CEEMAN Annual Conference

AlmaU partners with UNDP to facilitate innovative partnerships in Central Asia

Almaty Management University has partnered with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) initiative to create the EU-funded SDG Space platform to facilitate collaboration between business companies and the academic sector to advance the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) achievement in Central Asia.

The project led by SDG experts Akmaral Altalieva, Larisa Melnik, and Ainar Nurgaliyev, approached 109 small, medium, and large business companies to determine their awareness and needs in SDGs. A two-tier comprehensive survey allowed to assess the sustainability awareness and engagement of businesses in Kazakhstan.

The findings highlighted that most companies are highly aware of sustainability principles, including Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) criteria and the SDGs, and are increasingly integrating these goals into their operations. Companies mainly focus on reducing the environmental impact and adopting energy-efficient technologies, and implementing waste management systems. Additionally, businesses expressed a strong interest in collaborating with academic institutions to address sustainability challenges, particularly in areas like energy efficiency, waste reduction, and social impact.
